# **General Public Comment**

# <u>Business</u>

Boylan moved, Lingwall seconded and motion carried unanimously to approve the minutes from the December 17, 2020 meeting.

**21TP002 – Approve the 2021-2024 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Amendment #21-002.** Harrington reviewed the 2021-2024 TIP Amendment #21-002 which adds a pipe work project at various locations in the Rapid City area in 2023, a project to rehabilitate dynamic message board throughout the state in 2021, and a project to perform patching and repairs on bridge decking in 2021. The projects are funded with Federal and SDDOT funds. No local funds are involved.

# Lingwall moved, Boylan seconded and motion carried unanimously to approve the 2021-2024 Transportation Improvement Program Amendment #21-002.

**21TP005 – Approve the 2020 Annual Report.** Harrington reviewed 2020 Annual Report. This review lists the accomplishments and expenditures associated with the Unified Planning Work Program activities conducted during the past year.

Bob Heidgerken entered the meeting.

# Burns moved, Heidgerken seconded and motion carried unanimously to approve the 2020 Annual Report.

**21TP006 – Approve the Resolution #2021-01 Opposing the Proposed Changes to the Metropolitan Statistical Area Criteria.** The Office of Management and Budgets has recently proposed changes to the criteria for determining if an urban area is classified as



a Metropolitan Statistical Area or a Micropolitan Statistical Area. Rapid City is currently classified as a Metropolitan Statistical Area, with an urban population of greater than 50,000. One of the proposed changes would raise the minimum urban area population for a Metropolitan Statistical Area from 50,000 to 100,000. This would reclassify Rapid City from a Metropolitan Statistical Area to a Micropolitan Statistical Area. The reclassification would create issues with the historical comparisons and make analysis of population extremely difficult moving forward. Harrington reviewed this resolution opposing the change.

Lingwall moved, Heidgerken seconded and motion carried unanimously to approve the Resolution #2021-01 Opposing the Proposed Changes to the Metropolitan Statistical Area Criteria.

# Election of Vice-Chairman

Rick opened the nominations.

Boylan moved, Heidgerken seconded and motion electing Burns as Vice-Chair carried unanimously.
